Overview

Biblical references

Psalm 24:1-2 (NIV)

The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; for he founded it on the seas and established it on the waters.

Introduction

We worship a God who loves the Earth he created and calls us to care for it. Doing so is part of our worship and witness as we respond to a creation that is groaning (Romans 8:22). Churches participating in Eco Church come from a broad variety of traditions which, while bringing enormous breadth and richness, makes it challenging to craft one survey that covers the language and practice of every tradition – so please interpret the questions within your specific context. And perhaps be open to trying something new from another tradition.

Collective worship is an integral aspect of most churches. Many of the questions in this survey category relate to aspects of collective worship including special services, music, preaching and prayer. The format for teaching within our churches can take many forms, such as preaching during collective worship, small groups, preparation courses, and working with children and young people. This section asks churches to consider who we are and whose we are, and our rightful place as a part of creation, not apart from and certainly not above it.

Terminology

For consistency, the survey uses two main ways to refer to concern and care for the Earth. Reference to 'creation' and 'creation care' points to our interdependence on, and responsibility for, our God-given common home. Reference to the climate and nature crises signifies our recognition that urgent action is required. In addition, the term 'environmental issues' is used to refer to the wide spectrum of problems we face locally and globally.

Commitment and link to your Environmental Policy

At the outset of every category the Eco Church survey asks your church to acknowledge the climate and nature crises and demonstrate a commitment. A vision or mission statement can be a great place to acknowledge our role as Christians to care for and protect the Earth. An Environmental Policy is an excellent way for your church to present your recognition and outline the commitments you are making.

Question 1 of the Worship and Teaching category states: 'Our church recognises and teaches that creation care and action to address the climate and nature crises are integral to the Christian faith, life and worship and has made a formal commitment to A Rocha UK's Eco Church award scheme.'

A church's commitment to engage with creation, and take action to help protect it, is fundamental. How and what this commitment looks like can be/will be interpreted in different ways by different churches, as 'formal' will look different in each setting. It may be that you have agreed at a meeting (e.g. PCC, Church Members' Meeting) to engage with Eco Church and strive for awards. An important part of making a commitment is declaring this statement clearly as part of the identity of the church. You might, for example, share this statement within your church, on minutes, or on your website:

'We recognise and teach that creation care and action to address the climate and nature crises are integral to Christian faith, life and worship. We are committed to responding to this by participating in the A Rocha UK Eco Church award scheme.'

From this statement, your Environmental Policy can be developed.

Themes in Worship and Teaching

This category encompasses the following themes:

Theme 1: Worship and Prayer

- Aspects of worship: lament, preaching, prayer/intercession
- Where and how we worship: outdoors, pioneering models
- Worship resources: flowers, candles, wine, etc.

Theme 2: People

- Equipping and training leadership
- Pastoral care responding to environmental concerns
- Affirmation of environmental ministry

Theme 3: Teaching and Discipleship

- Creation care is part of baptism/confirmation/membership preparation
- Creation care is part of children's/youth/schools' work
- Creation care is part of courses and home group study
- Environmental speakers
