







Prayer

Why?

Perhaps one of the main purposes of prayer is to align our wills with the will of God, and so we pray, 'Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. We might pray for the earth in response to any number of environmental crises. But we should pray for the earth on a regular basis, as a matter of course, for the following reasons:

- Because we love God, and we naturally want to acknowledge God's love for all creation.

 When we pray for the earth, then we share in God's delight and concern for, the whole of creation.
- Because we naturally pray for what we care about, and care more for what we pray about, in a virtuous circle of praying and caring, reflection and action. As we align our wills with God's will, then we form within ourselves, or rather God forms in us, a disposition to action.
- Because we need to learn a less self-centred language, in order to rediscover our place within, and dependence on, the whole of creation. As we practise praying for the earth, we expand our understanding of the issues, and our ability to act effectively.
- Because humanity can be thought of as the 'priesthood' of creation, giving voice to the
 ceaseless praise that the whole creation offers to its Creator. The words at our disposal are
 a charism, or gift from God, which enable us to perform God's purpose, for us and all the
 world.







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How?

Eco Church covers a wide variety of Christian traditions, so we will each want to find our own culture for such prayers:

- We might pray for the earth on special occasions, such as Harvest Thanksgiving, or Creation Sunday.
- Praying for the earth shouldn't be a niche activity for a particular time or place, or for particular kinds of people (e.g., The 'eco-faithful'). It should be an 'ordinary' and everyday part of the public and private prayers of all Christian people.
- A benefit of using a prayer cycle whether weekly, monthly or annually is its combination of discipline and variety. It helps us to avoid the inclination not to respond, because we can't decide what to do; or the temptation to keep returning to the same topics, while neglecting others; or the tendency to get stuck in a rut, with too narrow a focus.
- Most forms of intercession in church tend to be divided into paragraphs on particular themes. A prayer for the earth could be inserted as a separate paragraph or integrated with praying for the nations of the world.
